Student Awards, Rights, Privileges and Penalties

The purpose of Clearwater Academy International is to educate students and help them have wins and be successful, both here at school and in their future life after high school graduation.

In line with that, the policy of the school is to encourage and reward activity and behavior that aligns with this and discourage and penalize activity and behavior which cuts across this purpose.

In the matter of rewards and penalties, rewards are more important than penalties.

By this is meant that most of the teacher and student attention should be on productive activity and the rewards that go along with it. Our purpose is to build the student up so that he becomes more able, more certain and more competent.

Student Rights

Students have certain rights at Clearwater Academy Int'l. The purpose of these rights is not to protect unethical behavior but to assist honest, ethical students.

A student has the right to receive a good education.

A student has the right to good service from teachers, word clearers, tutors, ethics officers and other staff.

A student has a right to get help.

A student has a right to set a good example without invalidation or harassment.

A student has the right to a safe environment.

A student has the right to be treated decently and with respect.

A student has the right to not be invalidated.

A student has a right to take actions to improve the school.

A student has the right to request recourse.

If a student has a problem with a teacher, word clearer, examiner, tutor, ethics officer, etc., he/she should first talk to the person to try and solve it.

If this doesn't handle it, he/she can write down the situation and/or talk to the Student Director.

If this doesn't handle it, he/she can write down the situation and/or talk to the Executive Director.

Student Privileges

A privilege is something that a student is allowed but is not automatically given to the student just for showing up. Privileges are earned through good behavior, good attendance and academic progress.

Privileges include participation in the following activities:

Field trips

School events (such as dances, Color War, parties, etc.)

Clubs

Sport teams

Off campus activities

Art and other electives

Non-uniform days

Dean's lunch

Penalties

The purpose of penalties is not just to keep students quiet or still but to keep them studying and to allow other students to study without interference or upset. The purpose is to curb unethical behavior so that being at Clearwater Academy is more enjoyable and rewarding.

These penalties are applied exactly as stated. By making offenses and penalties exact, students know exactly where they stand and this gives them more certainty and security. The teacher (or other personnel) clearly communicates what was violated and what must be done to handle. There are no long-winded explanations, no upset communicated, no make-wrong, no yelling, no threats—just good control. Additionally, this is communicated only to the student(s) involved and not to the whole class.

If a student fails to carry out a penalty, the penalty is doubled.

If the violation is minor or done by a student who is generally very upstat, the teacher may give a warning the first time, but if repeated, the exact penalty must be applied.

If a violation is particularly severe or repeated, the penalty may be increased. Also, the parent may be notified (even if this is not normally done for that penalty) and some or all privileges may be suspended.

Enforcement should be handled in whatever manner has the best overall effect. For example, a penalty like 5 minutes off the playground should just be enforced by the teacher. 15 minutes of work can just be done in the classroom. A larger penalty for a disruptive student gets handled by the Ethics Officer. In such a case, the Student to Ethics or Disruptive Student routing form would be used as well.

All rules covered in the Student/Parent Handbook still apply as well.

Additionally the Ethics Officer has the authority to increase or decrease the penalty based on the student's previous ethics history.
